Today, Writers' House is an open institution with the main task of representing Georgian culture - its traditions and modern processes and serves the interests of the national policy of the Government of Georgia for literature and the promotion of Georgian books and literature abroad.

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
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
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TALES WRITTEN IN A DRAWING ALBUM

The book helps fighting social stigmas and stereotypes about autism. The text itself employs a vocabulary that is inviting for beginning readers, considering that the stories are told in a light and gentle didactic tone that makes the reading pleasurable as well as educational.



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

He also gained prominence as a famous representative of the National-Liberation movement of Georgia.

The newly interpreted graphic novel by David Machavariani and Salome Benidze tells about a young knight who, with the help of his noble friends, fights to rescue his beloved princess captured by Kadji magicians in a high castle. Equality, love, friendship, dedication, and compassion are subjects the novel covers. The hundreds of immaculate hand-drawn illustrated panels in shades of black and white is, besides the story itself, the strong feature of this book. The text, partially presenting the original 12th century verses, is graphically linked to the comic bubbles, reflecting the dynamic of the characters' vibes.


THE STORY OF A BOY WHO WAS IN THE TALE

Going through his grandfather's old things, a boy finds a strange book with a spell leading him to a fatal stone that opens the way to a completely new world.

Thanks to the journey to imaginary cities, young readers become familiar with many interesting themes and are motivated to draw parallels not only with other books, but with history. For example, the people of Chigidi's realm do not know the weather until the king announces it in the morning, so they must wait to choose their clothing. If winter is declared, they light fireplaces, put on fur coats, and throw ashes onto the roads, even if the day is lit up by the sun.

This attitude towards dissidents was typical for an authoritarian regime. King Chigidi noticed that Kompotini was smarter than his ministers, so he declared him mad. However, he did not completely foredoom him – he opened a "kindness laboratory" for him in the palace and granted him a pension, too.

The chapter called *Calm city* is distinguished by its artistic employments and ironic undertones. The lifestyle of the city is "scientifically justified" and exemplary compared to other countries, but it is hurting to see wild animals tamed like lapdogs, families created according to the colours of their hair, and other harmful consequences of radicalism.



Levan Bolkvadze [1924-1986] was arrested at the age of 21 and exiled into a Soviet camp where he spent eight years followed by a three-year settlement sentence. At the time, he met Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn, whose several characters bear clear resemblance to Levan Bolkvadze. Being a philologist by education affected his writing, because a certain standard of refinement is achieved by writers who treat language not as a mere means of expression, but as the object of study. The Story of a Boy who was in the Tale was written in 1971 and is his only published book.


NODAR DUMBADZE

GRANNY, ILIKO, ILLARION, AND I

Granny, Iliko, Illarion, and I is Nodar Dumabadze's first, semi-autobiographical and most successful novel, released in 1960. The novel is set in a Georgian village and deals with the time of the Second World War, as the author himself experienced it as a teenager in Georgia. All able-bodied men leave to fight, leaving only women and elderly men behind. At the center of the novel is a young orphan, Zurikela, his grandmother, and the two sharp-tongued but wise and generous elderly neighbors Iliko and Ilarion. Iliko and Ilarion maintain an amazingly warm friendship but at the same time constantly argue with each other. Their relationship with Zurikela and Grandma Olga have gone far beyond friendly neighbours: Instead, they live as one family, sharing joys and troubles, and raising Zurikela. Throughout the story, Zurikela falls in love with his classmate Meri, writes his first poem, takes the university entrance exams, graduates from university and returns to his village.

This novel is full of genuine humour, warmth, and kindness. It depicts colourful pictures of an orphan boy from a village and the amazing people around him.

There is a very special film with the same name that is just as popular as the novel.



Nodar Dumbadze (1928-1984) was a Georgian writer. Dumbadze's father, a senior party official, was killed during the political purges of 1937 and his mother was banished to Siberia. Dumbadze therefore grew up with his grandmother. From 1945-1950, he studied economics at the State University of Tbilisi. After successfully completing his studies, he worked as a laboratory assistant at the Chair of Economic Planning. From 1967-1972, he was the editor of the satirical magazine Niangi ("Crocodile"). He was a member of the USSR Writers' Union and the Georgian Writers' Union, which he chaired from 1981-1984. Nodar Dumbadze received many awards. His works have been published in up to 90 countries.

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NAIRA GELASHVILI



Born in 1947, Naira Gelashvili is a Georgian writer, literary critic and civil society activist. She began her literary activities with translations of German philosophy and poetry and gained popularity among readers for non-conformist prose, which eventually provoked a negative reaction from the Soviet authorities. Despite this, Naira Gelashvili has written a number of novels and short stories and has won several literary awards, including the Literary Award LITERA 2018 for My Bird, My Rope, My River in the category of Best Novel, the Literary Award SABA 2013 in the category of Best Novel for I am That One and, in 2010, for The First Two Circles and All the Others; the Ilia Chavchavadze Prize for Artistic Work (2008): the Literary Prize GALA 2007 in the category of Best Literary Project for Rainer Maria Rilke (works in five volumes with commentaries); the Prize of the Austrian Ministry of Culture 1999 for translations of R. M. Rilke's works. The range of Naira Gelashvili's literary writings encompasses novels, stories, essays, poetry and children's prose, as well as children's songs and musical tales. In 1994, the writer founded and still heads the cultural-educational NGO Caucasian House - Centre for Cultural Relations, which plays a significant role in the peaceful cooperation of different cultures and religions among the people of Caucasus.

They share their knowledge with the younger generation. They regard children as their companions and teach them that when they see someone damaging something, they must raise their voice.

MIKO AND REI THE MYSTERY OF THE PURPLE ICE-CREAM

An unknown woman called Prizela rides a bicycle through the city, distributing purple ice-cream to the public. Several days later, something changes: People become indifferent, losing the ability to express sympathy for others. Rei, a boy of 10, lives with his grandmother ever since his parents disappeared without a trace many years ago. Rei cannot understand why everyone has changed.

Miko, a girl, has just arrived from the planet of Belatrix in order to save the city people from indifference and lack of empathy. Miko helps Rei understand the change in personality of the city. The purple ice-cream is the reason for all this. Prizela acts in accordance with the orders of Parjelo, a person intent to make people lose sympathy for each other so they will be vulnerable to subordination. However, there are special people on earth, known for their warmth: the children of the Sun.

Miko chooses Rei to save the Earth from Prizela's magic ice-cream because he is one of these children. He learns that Miko's parents are also held captive by Parjelo. With the help of small magic wheels, Miko and Rei reach the Kingdom of Plombirons and Eskimons, located on the Ice-Cream Island in the south and become close with the king and the queen during the annual ice-cream festival. They attend an official dinner with them in the Iceberg fortress, and manage to travel through time and learn the secret of the purple ice-cream. Prizela tries to stop the children, but Miko and Rei overcome all obstacles and achieve their goal.

Miko leaves the Earth for her planet and Rei goes back to his home, where his parents are waiting for him.



Born 1971 in Gori, Vaso Guleuri graduated from the Architecture Institute of the Georgian Technical University. He won second place at the Literary Contest TSERO 2007 for his collection of children's poems *Nursery School*. His first collection of children's works, *Foxy's shop*, was published in 2007 by Diogene Publishers. In 2011, Public Radio and Elf Publishing announced a contest of Christmas fairy tales in which Vasil Guleuri's play *Returned Sounds* won first place. In 2018, he was nominated for the ALMA (Astrid Lindgren Memorial Award). Throughout his career, he has written 17 books for children, including poems as well as fairy tales.

His book *Miko and Rei* received the lakob Gogebashvili Award 2019 for Children's and Youth Literature in the category of Best Children's Book.

She began writing children's stories in 1996 for a competition announced by the publishing house Diogenes. At this time, that she wrote Mr. Nosey the Champion and several short stories. She has been writing for adults ever since this time as well. Her fairy tales have been included in a collection of Georgian children's writers. She has worked for almost twenty years as an instructor and teaches computer graphics' programs. She writes film scripts.

MR. NOSEY THE CHAMPION

A strange man, Murtaz has a nose of an enormous length. He is very kind, with a distinguished love for children. The nose causes some great discomfort for Murtaz, but it also has many positive aspects. When Murtaz sneezes, lightweight things nearby fly into the air. He always buys two tickets for municipal transit due the nose's length, but his position of senior expert at work is due to precisely his extraordinary ability to smell... Murtaz thinks the nose hinders his search for happiness. He is a good football player. He even uses the nose with great success during fencing. He has many admirers. Murtaz also receives letters from a delighted fan...

The football championship is approaching in the town. One time, Murtaz has a strange dream. In the dream, he finds out that he has an extraordinary admirer – a pretty and attractive confectioner who is in love with the talented footballer and will also most certainly be at the decisive match of the championship. Roused to action by his unknown admirer, Murtaz jabs at the ball with a desire increased ten-fold - he prepares for the championship with utter devotion. Murtaz plays amazingly well in the decisive match, yet his entire attention is directed towards the spectators - he is searching for the unknown confectioner. The futile expectation is reflected in Murtaz's game as well - he is no longer interested in the ball or the whistling and shouting of the unsatisfied crowd. The final minutes have just started when Murtaz is startled by the shout of a strange, pretty girl - Murtaz realizes that this is his beloved. The guy carries out some wonderful moves and makes the game-changing goal. Murtaz's team becomes the champion.

The story *Sweet Land* tells us about one particular country and its life. In the country, there is an orange sun that rises in the morning and a banana moon that appears at night, the houses have the shape of jam pots, and instead of hail there is sugar candy that drops from the sky. There is a lemonade river and, instead of asphalt, there is a candy road.

Everyone is happy in this country – King Karamelius, Queen Marmeladina, their daughter Rafaela and all their subordinates, who are happy and kind people. The king and queen are so happy that they happily accept the choice of their daughter to marry a poor strolling musician.

In the story, kindness and cruelty constantly oppose each other – the king of the Bitter Land attacks the king of the Sweet Land, a vizier named "No one should know what we do" is organizing a conspiracy against the king, the chemist Alteusi's magical drug will transform King Sting and Queen Zazu into kind people for several hours. Friendship and art help the musician Linovio to get the heart of the princess.


There is a lot of fear and many obstacles in the story, and the characters are easy to understand for children as well as the reader. The author uses the principle of creating names: The cruel vizier "No one should know what we do", also the cruel Don Cactus and his children Biter and Spiker, the kind Queen Candy Jelly, the kind girl Rosy, Princess Rafaela, the nanny Bun, who is a fluffy and kind nanny, the shoe-maker Sole, the boy named Nut, who loves nuts, and the cruel King Sting II. There is a constant fight between justice and injustice, but eventually everything ends with the victory of justice.

The play written after the story was staged at the puppet theatre and at several children's theatres.



Born in 1968, Irma Malatsidze is a writer, children's book writer, journalist and translator. She graduated from the Shota Rustaveli Theatre and Film Georgia State University. She has worked as a journalist at Public Broadcasting and several news agencies and newspapers, among them Alia, Resonance and Georgian Times. Irma Malatsidze was the winner in the category of debutant children writer of the competition New Names in Georgian Children Literature, organized by the journal Dila in 2003. Since her first prize for the story A Snail Named Keramucha, she systematically publishes her texts in different literature editions. Irma Malatsidze is the founder and manager of the Children's Literature Development Foundation Libo. She was an initiator of introducing National Children's Book Day (27th of October) in Georgia.

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BONDO MATSABERIDZE

RAIN FAIRY TALE



Born in 1959, Bondo Matsaberidze graduated in 1990 from the Faculty of Poetry at the Maxim Gorky Literary Institute in Moscow. Back in his homeland, Bondo Matsaberidze established Alaverdi, one of the first independent publishing houses in Georgia, which he headed until 1994. Years later, he founded another publishing house, Bakmi, which specialises in children's literature and fiction with high design standards. Matsaberidze remains the head of Bakmi. Since 1995, he has been a member of the Writers' Union of Georgia. He is the author of a poetry collection, as well as of a collection of essays.

Chochromeli is an ant, who is industrious, skillfull, and hard-working. The crops he harvests are abundant and his household is quite well-functioning. However, his excessive generosity and kind heart place him in a difficult situation, as his mercifulness leads him to absolute destitution. Everyone forgets Chochromeli, who generously gave others what he had obtained due to hard work. Moreover, even birds abandon his barn that no longer has any grains.

In the meantime, the weather becomes colder and the village is facing the coming winter. The hearth also turns cold. How can someone, who has nothing, survive the winter? Chochromeli, who is doomed to starvation, finds it difficult to sustain himself. Finding no other way out, he closes the door of his home at dawn and sets off in search of fortune.

It is at this moment that he meets a bee, Pipi, who is as kind as he is. They familiarise themselves with each other, treat each other as host and guest, and until Pipi goes into hibernation, they have a sweet talk. However, their meeting and friendship do not end here. Chochromeli and Pipi vow to meet again in spring.

The author stops telling the fairy tale here, leaving a blank space in the text and asking children to think and write their own descriptions of Chochromeli's and Pipi's meeting early in spring. Children are to send him what they write and he promises to publish their descriptions as a book.

In the meantime, he moved to California where he opened his own studio. For 14 Crystal Theory he received the Literary Prize SABA and the lakob Gogebasvhili Children's and Youth Literary Award for Best Debut of 2019.

ARCHIL **SULAKAURI**

THE MAGIC DRESS



Archil Sulakauri (1927-1997), Georgian writer and winner of the Shota Rustaveli State Prize for children's literature, graduated from Tbilisi State University with a degree in Georgian language and literature. Already by the age of nineteen, he was a published poet. Sulakauri was the head of the children's literature publishing house Nakaduli and editor-in-chief of the literary journal Mnatobi. He wrote numerous poems, stories and novels, including acclaimed works such as Holiday on My Street, Waves Strive for the Shore, The Goldfish and many others. Archil Sulakauri achieved immense success with Georgian audiences with his fairy tales The Magic Dress, The Blue Deer and The Stubborn Rabbits. His work The Adventures of Piccolo instantly became one of the most acclaimed children's books in Georgia. He also contributed to the Georgian film industry and wrote several popular film scripts.

Maka, a young student, plays hide-and-seek in the yard and ends up hiding in the attic, which is full of old items: jewel boxes filled with expired coins, stuffed animals, a cracked mirror, a wardrobe full of old dresses. Maka decides to try on one of the dresses, but finds it difficult as the dress shrinks. Shrinking with the dress, Maka becomes a doll-sized creature. Around her, the attic turns to life. Maka disappears deep into the wardrobe, finding herself in a realm of expired copper coins.

In this world, Maka is the daughter of the Sun and wears a gold amulet around her neck, pouring absolute excitement into the realm. Maka is taken with great honour to the palace of King Dharma I. Everyone is old in this country – the king, the viziers, the commander-in-chief. The king of the Country of Moneyboxes, Plaster XXVII., learns about the appearance of the daughter of the Sun. He visits Dharma I. and invites Maka to the Country of Moneyboxes with the malicious purpose of laying his hands on the gold amulet.

This is the main conflict of the fairy tale – a confrontation between the countries of coins and moneyboxes, that develops into war, to gain the gold amulet.

Written during the Soviet Era, the author metaphorically describes an image of the Soviet regime in this fairy tale. He shows Brezhnev's decrepit government, a fake commander-in-chief, who is a good-for-nothing braggart, and the empty king ("the king is naked" is replaced in the Country of Moneyboxes with "the king is empty").

"With impressive heroes, exceptional humour, and an attractive plot, this is one of the best fairy tales written in the Georgian language. It can be said that The Magic Dress is a kind of Georgian Alice in Wonderland". (Sh. latashvili, writer, critic)

Get to know Dudo and his family: a director with cats and the stringent teacher Meri, the eccentric Nora who wears a red ribbon and is in love with Simon, cousin Tartaline and her goat, a suitcase, and birds, the frog Croak-Croak, and many others. And there is also the magician Posi, who became so angry once that...

Lela Tsutskiridze not only wrote *The Merry Family and Others*, but also illustrated it. The black and white illustrations emanate a sense of humour, adding joy to a text that is already quite joyful. At the beginning, we see Grandma Meow flying in the air and discover what happened to the broken dinnerware set with geese and 50 sugared (hopefully, you will not be saddened because of this incident). Remember that from now on, you have to think and behave like a member of the joyful family. The book tells us the story of one big family and their friends. The characters are funny, but the story can sometimes be sad and scary. This book gives us a clear lesson about the importance of familial love and understanding and the consequences of a cold heart.



Born 1964 in Tbilisi, Lela Tsutskiridze is an author, children's writer, artist and illustrator. She graduated from Tbilisi State University where she studied Georgian language and literature. She has worked for various publishing houses and kid's shows. Currently she works as a teacher for a book club and Sunday school. Lela Tsutskiridze is the author of a USAID project on Georgia's elementary school textbooks. She has been published in various literary magazines, such as Literaturuli Palitra, Tsiskari, Akhali Saunje, Arili, Literaturuli Gazeti, the kid's magazines Dila, Karuseli. Lela Tsutskiridze was shortlisted for several literary prizes, among them SABA Literary Prize 2017 in the category of Best Poetry Collection for Imagine, Elisabeth. She worked as an illustrator and book designer for many books published in different publishing houses in Georgia.



Montebulsu or Eli's unusual Journey is the only fairy tale by Zaza Tvaradze published after his death. In 2009, it was awarded the Gala Prize for Best Children's Book of the Year.

Eli is a little but fearless girl, who is not even afraid of evil magicians. Eli lives in a multi-storey house on the outskirts of Tbilisi in Grmagele. She travels alone to the village of Okrokana, near Tbilisi, to search for her father, who went missing during the war. On her way to the village, she encounters evil magicians.

Montebulsu is an owl-shaped, copper talisman that Eli's father gave to her as a present. As Eli searches for her father, Montebulsu revives and helps Eli with her search. After thousands of dangerous adventures throughout fabulous places, Eli, finally, finds her father.
